
1. Complete an Online Membership Application (look for the blue button on that page).

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**WHY BE A MEMBER OF YOUR LOCAL GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY?**

Although I have lived in Warren County most of my life (I grew up here), I was not a member of WCGS for many years. My interest in genealogy started early and I began putting the puzzle pieces together of my family tree in high school. But I had no ancestors from Warren County, so didn't even think about starting where I lived.

One thing I did not know until much later is that there is a learning curve in researching certain records. If I would have joined my local society and spent some time researching or volunteering there, the knowledge I would have gained would have been invaluable and saved me a great deal of time and money. Think about it, how many times have you traveled to an area to do some research and felt frustrated at not knowing exactly what you were doing or how to go about it? How many times did you feel like your trip was not as productive because when you finally started to find the information you were seeking, it was closing time, or you had to leave?

These days, there are more and more records available online. But for all that is available on the internet, the number of records and information that is NOT on the internet is far greater! Doing in-person research has led me to discoveries I never anticipated and allowed me to explore areas where my ancestors lived. I have never regretted any of my research trips, but I have regretted not being more knowledgeable before I went on some of them.

Joining a local genealogical society gives you the opportunity to learn close to home. Many have volunteer opportunities and will teach you what to do. There are programs and classes where you can learn more. For a very small investment, it can have a return worth far more!

While I have talked about joining a local genealogical society, it is also important to join the societies in the areas where you are researching. Some even have projects where you can volunteer to help remotely! That's a great way to start learning about the area. If you don't live in the area you are researching, or have the ability to travel there, it can sometimes be more cost effective and efficient to enlist the help of a volunteer or paid researcher from that area, and the local genealogical society is where you will start.

We have amazing volunteers at WCGS, and I have learned so much from them. Why did I never think about starting in my own backyard?

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## ISAAC MORRIS Sr. (ca. 1741-1828) OBITUARY

Departed this life on the evening of the 25th of April last, Isaac Morris, Sen, in the 87th year of his age. Mr. Morris was one of the first adventurers to this state. On his arrival he located himself and family, on the bank of the Ohio River at Columbia near the mouth of the Little Miami and 6 or 7 miles above the now city of Cincinnati. After a few years residence, finding the settlement or station as it was then called too much confined, he with several other families from the same place, removed 8 miles up the little Miami to Round Bottom, being one of the first stations or settlements made remote from the River Ohio during the continuance of the Indian wars. At the latter place he remained until the war was over, which was after the total defeat of the Indians in the fall of 1794, by General Wayne, and final cessation of hostilities by the treaty made with the Indians by the same General in August 1795. After the latter period he removed to this neighbourhood, where he has permanently resided ever since. For the first 7 years of his residence in this country he was on a frontier border, and constantly exposed to the assaults of a savage foe, and during which period a considerable number of his friends and neighbors were killed, wounded, and taken prisoners, and often within a bow shot of the deceased. Nor was this all the affliction he suffered in that cruel and bloody war. In 1791 his eldest son, and only male child who had then arrived to maturity, accompanied General St. Clair in his campaign against the Indians, and was slain in the disastrous battle on the fourth of November of that year.

Mr. Morris was originally from New Jersey, where he encountered all the difficulties attendant on the revolutionary war; and being zealous in the cause he not only devoted a considerable portion of his own time to the public service, having at one time the command of a brigade of wagons, but also furnished supplies for the army; by which means he sustained a great loss, nearly to the whole extent of his property, thro' the depreciation of continental money. This was probably one cause for his removing to a new and unsettled country; justly thinking that he thereby could better begin the world anew, and provide for a rising and large family.

He has left a numerous family of Children, grand children and great grand children to lament his loss. Mr. M. experienced very little sickness, barely complaining a few days previous to his death of being unwell. In him, the lamp of life seemed rather to burn out for want of aliment, than to be extinguished. To the most rigid observer the manners and principles of the deceased were at all times those of a sober peaceable, orderly, and exemplary citizen. During life he was an industrious and thrifty farmer, laboring at the plough, the ax, and the scythe. – He was a practical professor and zealous advocate of the Christian religion, and had long expressed a confident, hope nay an unwavering assurance, that he will rise with his triumphant redeemer to life immortal.

### Notes:

- Warren County Deed Book, Vol. 1 page 47-48 On 4 August 1802, **Martin Baum** of Cincinnati, and **Jacob Bowman** of Brown Ville, Pennsylvania sold 400 acres of land to Isaac Morris of Hamilton County, Northwest Territory for \$1150. The land located in Section 19 2<sup>nd</sup> Township and 4<sup>th</sup> Range in Hamilton Twp., Northwest Territory.
- In the 1807 Warren County Tax Duplicate, Isaac Morris is listed as the owner of 400 acres in the south part of Section 19, Township 3 East Range 4 North. In later years this became the approximate location of the North Family of Shakers and today is part of Armco Park on State Route 741.
- Isaac was buried in the Lewis Farm Cemetery in Red Lion. You can see more about him on his Find a Grave Memorial # 80599876 at <https://www.findagrave.com/memorial/80599876/isaac-morris>.

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## WARREN COUNTY OHGENWEB PROJECT ONLINE

The Warren County OHGENWEB Project had been hosted on Rootsweb.com for free since before 2003. It had grown to over 20 gigabytes in 859 folders containing 182,509 files.

Our Warren County Virtual cemetery project <https://sites.rootsweb.com/~ohwarren/Cemetery/burial.htm> was created within our GenWeb project starting around 2003 and grew to 98,000 burials in 95 different cemeteries with over 65,000 gravestone photos accounting for over 90% of the Warren County OHGenWeb content.

Ancestry.com (which owns Rootsweb.com) took all of RootsWeb offline in 2017 due to some security issues. It has gradually restored content to RootsWeb.com but never restored any of our GenWeb project. Thanks to the efforts of our webmaster, Jo Roth, RootsWeb/Ancestry has **temporarily** restored the entire Warren County GenWeb project, including the virtual cemetery project, but indicated that they cannot keep it online because of the size (and some other issues).
