Kay Frances Tibbals Davenport, of Orem, Utah, peacefully passed away on Friday, December 2, 2022, in St. George, Utah, surrounded by her daughters and grandchildren, whom she greatly loved. She was born June 13, 1937, in Columbus, Ohio, to Alfred Todd and Helen Adaline Lea Tibbals. Kay graduated from Upper Arlington High School then made the bold move to Nashville, Tennessee, where she received her bachelor's degree in Sociology from Vanderbilt University and was a member of $AO\pi$ Sorority. In 1959, Kay married Gene L. Davenport, and in 1963, they moved to Jackson, Tennessee, where two daughters, Pamela and Deborah, were born. Kay and Gene later divorced.

In 1972, while in Jackson, Kay became a member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints; she was a very dedicated and faithful member the rest of her life. In 1975, Kay and her two daughters moved to Orem, Utah, where Kay joyfully resided until June of 2022, when she moved to assisted living in St. George, Utah, to be closer to her daughters.

Some of the joys in Kay's life (besides her family) included: traveling around the world; taking pictures of creative mailboxes; researching family history; weekly group temple trips; being a girl scout leader; attending plays at the Hale Theater; watching BYU sports, especially football; playing the piano; doing puzzles; and spending time in the beautiful mountains. She was a very generous person, made friends easily, and left a lasting impression on all.



WARREN COUNTY RECORDS CENTER & ARCHIVES

Processing & Poultry

You may be wondering what archival processing and poultry have in common, and to be honest, we were also a little puzzled when we kept running across the word poultry. Archives Specialist, Tori Roberts, has been working diligently on processing our historic Clerk of Courts State Cases over the past several years. This project has always been filled with interesting examples of crimes that have taken place here in Warren County. The actual processing project has consisted of unpackaging, flattening, organizing, rehousing into archival safe folders and boxes, and creating an index for the original court documents. These cases consist of criminal offenses within Warren County dating back to 1805.



For the first 200 plus years the crimes committed were consistent in nature with a handful of exceptions here and there. Things took a quick turn during May Term of 1930, with the introduction of crimes such as "unlawfully entering premises of the personal property of ... for the purpose of carrying away poultry," or "larceny of three chickens." Theft of farm animals was not new for the county but theft of poultry specifically at the scale we were encountering was. The first nine cases for October Term of 1931 were related to the theft of poultry. Upon further investigation, Tori was able to determine that this crime was not isolated to Warren County, Ohio, but seems to have been an issue that plagued the country.

Consistency of crimes committed following the start of the Great Depression become apparent very quickly. Connecting Warren County citizens to larger historic events has always interested us while processing our records. This has been one of the most obvious examples of how local citizens were struggling along with the nation. Instances of robbery, breaking and entering, and theft took a severe uptick in their frequency starting in the 1930's. 1926 OBITUARY FOR WILLIAM HADLEY

Miami Gazette (Waynesville, Ohio), 1926

William Hadley was born near Clarksville, Ohio, December 1, 1840, and died at the home of a daughter in Waynesville on May 18, 1926. He bore the name of his grandfather, who, with his family, came to Clinton county, Ohio, from North Carolina early in the last century. The village of Clarksville was laid out on a portion of the land purchased by this grandfather and named by him in honor of his wife, Sarah Clark. A son, Joshua, with his wife, Ruth Edwards Hadley, settled on a farm near Clarksville, and of their seven children William outlived all the others.

During the Civil War he felt the call to arms and enlisted in Company B, Reg. 88, Ohio Volunteer Infantry, October 12, 1862, and served until honorably discharged, December 5, 1864.

On December 5, 1867, he married Farinda VanDoren. To this union six children were born, two of which died in infancy. There remain to mourn his loss two sons and two daughters: Alvin, of Shelby, Ohio, Nathan, Clarksville, Mrs. Lina Madden, of Waynesville, and Mrs. Louise Urton, of Dayton; and three grandchildren, Duane, Chester and Mabel Hadley. When a niece, Mrs. Amanda Mitchell died in 1901, leaving an infant son, Wilbur, Wm. Hadley and his wife opened their home and hearts to the little orphan and reared him as one of their own.

Wm. Hadley was a tiller of the soil and spent most of his life on the old VanDoren homestead. In 1914 the farm was sold and he and his wife moved to Clarksville to make their home. At the time of his wife's death in January, 1920, his health was so impaired that it was feared he would not long survive her. But through faithful ministrations of his children, among whom he divided his time, his days were lengthened far beyond the allotted three score years and ten.

A birthright Friend, he retained his membership in the Clarksville Friends Meeting till the last. Integrity, honesty, loyalty, a firm adherence to the right gave evidence of high ideals and sterling worth. With unobtrusive fortitude he met his many traits; his sunny smile brightened many a moment and the bubbling spring of his kindley humor smoothed many a troubled hour. With patience unwavering, he bore his years of invalidism, grateful for every mark of attention. A gentle spirit has returned to its Maker.
